



Episode One

## A Fearful Storm

Elizabeth Randolph Shaw moves in with her grandfather, a doctor in Washington after she loses her family and fortune.

Lizzie asks her friend Reed to help her set up a photo studio. But when she starts spending all her time there, her grandfather suspects hysteria. Lizzie works to avoid an experimental isolation cure, seeking out help from herbalist Sarah Brown.

Sarah balances treating Lizzie with a new romance, spending time with charismatic preacher John Hayden. With the help of new friends Teresa, Jack, and Sully, Lizzie hosts a New Year's reception at her photo studio. They celebrate all night, ending up at a notorious Parlor house. Jack and Sully escort Lizzie and a group of actresses back to her photo studio. Through the window, Lizzie sees Jack and Sully kiss.

While waiting to treat Justice Taney, Sarah sees his copy of the Dred Scott decision. She learns the court plans to rule that black people have no federal rights. Lizzie takes a suggestive picture of the actresses in their nightgowns. They are interrupted by frantic knocking on the door. The theater is on fire, and Sully is missing.



2. A Path of Flame and Fire

The National Theater burns down.

Sarah and John devise a plan to evacuate formerly enslaved people hiding in Washington. Jack helps Lizzie sell her titillating picture to Mary Ann. Reed proposes to Temperance.



3. Amid Life's Fever and Fret

A mystery disease sweeps through the National Hotel. Reed and Tempe marry at her father's bedside before he dies. Lizzie devises a new mix of photo chemistry that is safer, and faster. She tests it for the first time while photographing the Inauguration.



4. A Tiny, Humble Seed

The mystery disease continues to spread. John proposes to Sarah, and she accepts. Mary Ann offers up her farm in Virginia as a location for a photo shoot. Lizzie has an unexpected encounter with one of the actresses.



5. And Nets of Sin Where'er I Tread

Jacks sells all of Lizzie's prints to a publisher who commissions more. Thirteen-year-old Anthony Comstock feels ashamed when he can't stop masturbating to a picture of actresses in their shifts. Desperate, he takes it to a prayer meeting, where he launches into a fiery speech denouncing the sinners who sold it to him before throwing it into a fire.



6. For A while, All Strife Forgotten

Teresa has an affair with a District Attorney, who introduces Lizzie to a Congressman.

Dr. Randolph and Sarah convert a space at the clinic into a hideaway for evacuees.

Tempe struggles with postpartum

depression after her daughter is born.



7. A More Abundant Life

Lizzie's legitimate business serves as a front for her lucrative secret business.

Jack takes Sully on a romantic trip.

When Lizzie breaks things off with the Congressman, he flies into a rage and writes a letter to Teresa's husband detailing her affair. John surprises Sarah with a wedding celebration.



8. An Avalanche of Woe

Teresa's husband confronts her about her affair. She denies everything. He rages at her, forcing her to write a humiliating confession. When her worried lover walks by the house, Sickles fatally shoots him. Lizzie can't contact Teresa, whose family refuses all callers. Jack and Mary Ann encourage her to sell her photos of Teresa but Lizzie refuses. Sickles is acquitted after his lawyers argue he was driven temporarily insane. Dr. Randolph clashes with a colleague during the American Medical Association annual meeting. Lizzie uses cash from her illicit business to make a large anonymous donation to Sarah's new women's clinic.



9. Sackcloth of the Darkest Hue

Lizzie's legitimate business suffers from her connection to Teresa's scandal. Tempe falls deeper into postpartum depression. Lizzie fumbles her exposure while photographing a dying boy, causing a second image of the boy to appear just above the first. The family is sure that Lizzie captured the boy's spirit as it ascended to heaven.



10. A Vague Unrest

Tempe consults Sarah, confiding that she hasn't been herself since the baby was born. Sarah prescribes a new regimen and teaches her the rhythm method. Later, Sarah suddenly gets out her own journal and calendar, confirming her own pregnancy.



II. No Time to Yield

Lizzie escapes election violence in Washington by spending more time at the farm. Sarah works late into her pregnancy. After the birth, she stays home with their new daughter while John goes South to pick up several evacuees. In Connecticut, Anthony Comstock gives a fiery speech about sin at an all day prayer meeting.



12. Shades of Night

John returns. one of the escapees is startled when he sees Sarah. They realize he is Sarah's father. Reed is tasked with recruitment for the new Military Telegraph Corps. Tempe is sent home. Sarah says goodbye to Meg and her father when they decide to keep going north.



13. The Storms of War

The war has driven a surge in photography. Lizzie and Jack take portraits of the new recruits, and sell them works from her collection. For safety and ease of travel, Lizzie wears men's clothing on their trips. Sarah joins the Sanitary Commission. John joins the Union Navy. Mary Ann now runs a spy operation.



14. A Murmur of the Rain

Sarah hands out a birth control pamphlet at the contraband's camp. Tempe organizes the telegraph wives into a volunteer unit.
Sully is upset when Jack enlists in the army.
Mary Ann asks Lizzie to deliver a message across enemy lines. Lizzie dresses as a man, and easily gains the access she needs.



15. Of Evil and Unrest

Jack and Anthony Comstock clash in occupied St. Augustine. John joins the Potomac flotilla, fighting confederate guerrillas and rescuing refugees. When an outbreak hits the flotilla, Sarah leaves to help. Mary Ann acquires papers for Lizzie's male persona so she can take on another mission. Reed is declared missing.



16. A Prayer for Light

Tempe, and twenty other women are killed in a massive explosion at the arsenal. Sarah finds John in bad condition. She works to save his life while the crew fends off a guerrilla attack. Lizzie sets out on a dangerous mission to tell Reed about Tempe and bring him home to his daughter.

## LATER SEASONS

During Reconstruction, Reed gets involved in politics and learns of Lizzie's "other" business from a reporter. Anthony Comstock helps found the Society for the Suppression of Vice and starts raiding publishers in New York. Lizzie and Jack consider publishing her work themselves. Sarah's clinic is the target of an ongoing protest, and the story of it appears in the papers. While working at Howard University hospital, she expands the clinic, and writes a textbook on women's health. Lizzie helps Sarah get the book published. Comstock comes to Washington and targets Sarah. With Reed's help, Lizzie and Sarah manage to save the clinic, and stay out of jail, but every copy of Sarah's textbook is destroyed. Comstock raids Lizzie's studio and destroys her library of images.





**NANCY OSTERTAG** 

"I am an army brat, and Vanessa is a firehouse kid. Because we both grew up in communities that centered around service, we share certain core values and experiences that have guided us as we've developed this story."

Early in my career, I saw a book on Victorian erotica that shocked me but also sparked my curiosity. When I tried to research the first American erotic photographers, I found almost nothing. The culprit, I soon learned, was Anthony Comstock. In the 19th century, Comstock personally destroyed tons of "obscene" material and prosecuted publishers as part of his crusade to purify America. Comstock also targeted midwives and female physicians. He destroyed medical textbooks that detailed female anatomy and anything related to birth control or abortion. Vanessa and I started writing this story in part to ask the question, "How did women's reproductive health and pornography end up in the same act of Congress, and how has that fact played out in women's lives over time?" Our main characters are composites drawn from history using primary sources. Our story is about people branded as radicals in their time because they fought for rights that Americans now take for granted.

"Docudrama has been a constant in my film and television career. I believe in the power of storytelling to effect real change, and I think this is an important story to share."

My dad has always loved history. Growing up, he taught me to look to history for context and wisdom when trying to understand something happening today. When Nancy and I started crafting Radicals, the incredible parallels between that time and ours drew me into the story. In the late 1850s, Americans were experiencing multiple social and technological upheavals, something anyone who's lived through the last 30 years is intimately familiar with. As we've been writing, the Comstock Act has gone from being a forgotten law that most people didn't know was still on the books, to being in the news almost daily. Radicals may be a story set in the past, but it is as much about current events as it is about history.
